Across the province 180 Grade R teachers volunteered to be Lead Teachers and ambassadors for the Emergent Literacy (ELIT) project. This involved attending a 5-day block training on emergent literacy, attending monthly training workshops in their districts and implementing the STELLAR programme in their classrooms in 2015.

These leaders in the Grade R field are now tasked with rolling out the ELIT project to 3000 Grade R teachers across the province and will be facilitating training and guiding teachers through the learning journey they walked last year.

We are inspired by the Lead Teachers' commitment and dedication to the project despite their full time teaching obligations. We acknowledge the exceptional guidance and support from the ECD and Foundation Phase Advisors across the province.

My story

Here is another remarkable story by a member of the Wordworks network – this time from KZN. We are inspired by women like Sheilagh who, in their later years, believe they can make a difference and take the initiative to start a project.

My name is Sheilagh Bill and I am the Co-ordinator of a *Ready, steady ... read and write* programme in KwaDabeka, Pinetown. My background is in software development, and I have a passion for reading. Now that I am retired I have time and wanted to give back. I heard about Wordworks from my daughter in Cape Town and it seemed just the right, structured programme, with all the resources provided to get started.



My friend Elaine, who is a teacher, joined me and we approached our church for support. After the Wordworks training, we started last year with 3 volunteers from the church and have grown to 7. We travel to the school where the principal welcomes us and we are building good relationships with the teachers.

We work with First Additional Language with Grade 2s who have very little English. Our biggest challenge is that most of us don't speak isiZulu but we have one Zulu speaking lady who is a great asset to us. The children are very shy to start but soon warm up and love coming to the sessions.

Our volunteers are so dedicated and all love the programme. We have become a close knit team. We also started a school library last year, which is a work in progress, and have collected about 600 books.

Top tip:

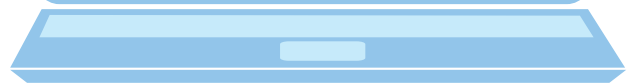
It's never too early or too late to read to your child

Books for young children should be in their mother tongue wherever possible. For babies, choose books with bright pictures or photographs of people. Toddlers love stories with repetition, rhyme and actions. Choose some books that reflect your toddler's world and choose others that will make your child curious about new experiences. As children grow they start asking for more complex stories that don't end in one sitting. Continue reading to children even after they have become proficient readers.



Did you see?
